



### **Resurgence Mitigations**

As detailed in the July 15 Restore Illinois resurgence plan, new mitigations will be applied if a region's positivity rate averages greater than or equal to 8 percent for three consecutive days, or if a region experiences a sustained increase in the positivity rate (increases in 7 out of 10 days) AND sustained increase in hospital admissions for a COVID-19 like illness or reduction in hospital capacity that threatens surge capabilities (availability of ICU or med/surgical beds under 20 percent). If a region has exceeded IDPH criteria that trigger additional mitigations to combat a resurgence of COVID-19 and prevent uncontrollable spread, new measures are necessary to curtail further spread.

Regions that are experiencing a resurgence of COVID-19 will operate under these new mitigation requirements:

SETTING	MITIGATION REQUIREMENTS			
Bars	<ul> <li>All bars close at 11pm and may reopen no earlier than 6am the following day</li> <li>No indoor service</li> <li>All bar patrons should be seated at tables outside</li> <li>No ordering, seating, or congregating at bar (bar stools should be removed)</li> <li>Tables should be 6 feet apart</li> <li>No standing or congregating indoors or outdoors while waiting for a table or exiting</li> <li>No dancing or standing indoors</li> <li>Reservations required for each party</li> <li>No seating of multiple parties at one table</li> </ul>			
Restaurants	<ul> <li>All restaurants close at 11pm and may reopen no earlier than 6am the following day</li> <li>No indoor dining or bar service</li> <li>Tables should be 6 feet apart No standing or congregating indoors or outdoors while waiting for a table or exiting</li> <li>Reservations required for each party</li> <li>No seating of multiple parties at one table</li> </ul>			
Meetings, social events and gatherings (including weddings, funerals, potlucks, etc.)	<ul> <li>Limit to lesser of 25 guests or 25% of overall room capacity both indoors and outdoors</li> <li>No party buses</li> <li>Gaming and Casinos close at 11:00pm, are limited to 25 percent capacity, and follow mitigations for bars and restaurants, if applicable</li> </ul>			
Organized group recreational activities (fitness centers, sports, etc.)	<ul> <li>No change</li> <li>All Sports Guidance effective August 15, 2020, remains in effect</li> <li>Outdoor Activities (not included in the above exposure settings) continue per current DCEO guidance</li> </ul>			

IDPH will continue to track the positivity rate in regions requiring additional mitigations over a 14-day monitoring period to determine if mitigations can be relaxed, if additional mitigations are required, or if current mitigation should remain in place. If the positivity rate averages less than or equal to 6.5 percent over a 3-day period, the region will return to Phase 4 mitigations under the Restore Illinois Plan. If the positivity rate averages between 6.5 percent and 8 percent, IDPH will continue to monitor the region to determine if additional mitigations are needed. If the positivity rate averages greater than or equal to 8 percent after 14 days, more stringent mitigations can be applied to further reduce spread of the virus, which could include reducing capacity on organized group recreation, fitness or other activities supported by local contact tracing data and temporary suspension of certain activities.

### Mitigaciones de reaparición

Como se detalla en el plan de resurgimiento de Restore Illinois del 15 de julio, se aplicarán nuevas mitigaciones si el promedio de la tasa de positividad de una región es mayor o igual al 8 por ciento durante tres días consecutivos, o si una región experimenta un aumento sostenido en la tasa de positividad (aumentos en 7 de 10 días) Y un aumento sostenido en las admisiones hospitalarias por una enfermedad similar a la COVID-19 o reducción en la capacidad hospitalaria que amenace la capacidad de respuesta (disponibilidad de UCI o camas médicas / quirúrgicas por debajo del 20 por ciento). Si la región ha superado los criterios del Departamento de Salud Pública de Illinois (Illinois Department of Public Health, IDPH) que activan mitigaciones adicionales para combatir la reaparición de la COVID-19 y evitar la propagación incontrolable, se necesitan nuevas medidas para reducir la propagación.

Las regiones que están experimentando una reaparición de la COVID-19 operarán bajo estos nuevos requisitos de mitigación:

El IDPH continuará haciendo seguimiento a la tasa de positividad en regiones que requieran mitigaciones adicionales, durante un período de monitoreo de 14 días, para determinar si las mitigaciones se pueden suavizar, si se requieren mitigaciones adicionales o si la mitigación actual debe mantenerse. Si la tasa de positividad promedia menos o es igual a 6.5 por ciento durante un período

## SBA Offers Working Capital Loans to Small Businesses in Illinois Affected by Civil Unrest

**WASHINGTON** – Low-interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) are available to Illinois small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small aquaculture businesses and private nonprofit organizations affected by Civil Unrest from May 26, through July 30, 2020.

SBA Administrator Jovita Carranza made the loans available in response to a letter from Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker dated Sept. 28, requesting a disaster declaration by the SBA. The declaration covers the following areas: Adams, Boone, Brown, Bureau, Carroll, Cass, Champaign, Christian, Clinton, Cook, De Witt, Dekalb, Douglas, DuPage, Edgar, Ford, Fulton, Greene, Grundy, Hancock, Henry, Jo Daviess, Kane, Kankakee, Kendall, Knox, La Salle, Lee, Livingston, Logan, Macon, Macoupin, Madison, Marshall, Mason, McHenry, McLean, Menard, Mercer, Monroe, Montgomery, Morgan, Moultrie, Ogle, Peoria, Piatt, Pike, Putnam, Randolph, Saint Clair, Sangamon, Schuyler, Scott, Shelby, Stark, Stephenson, Tazewell, Vermilion, Warren, Washington, Will, Winnebago and Woodford counties in Illinois; Lake County in Indiana; Lewis, Marion and Saint Louis counties and Saint Louis City in Missouri; and Green, Lafayette, Rock and Walworth counties in Wisconsin.

"The SBA is strongly committed to providing the people of Illinois with the most effective and customerfocused response possible to assist small businesses with federal Economic Injury Disaster Loans," said Carranza. "Getting businesses and communities up and running after a disaster is our highest priority at SBA."

In accordance with health precautions for COVID-19, the SBA will not establish a field presence to assist survivors. However, the SBA will continue to provide customer service and conduct outreach virtually with webinars, skype calls, phone assistance and step-by-step application assistance. The SBA has opened a Virtual Business Recovery Center to help survivors apply online using the Electronic Loan Application via the SBA's secure website at <a href="https://DisasterLoanAssistance.sba.gov/">https://DisasterLoanAssistance.sba.gov/</a>. Virtual Customer Support Representatives are available to help applicants complete the online application during these hours:
